

PREGNANCY RISKS IN DELAWARE AND THE U.S.

The United States is one of very few developed countries where deaths related to pregnancy or childbirth are increasing. Black mothers are particularly at risk.



IN DELAWARE, almost 9 OUT OF 10 PREGNANCY-RELATED DEATHS occur while a woman is pregnant or within 42 days after delivery.



IN DELAWARE, risk factors such as OBESITY, PRE-ECLAMPSIA, AND HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE ARE ON THE RISE in women of reproductive age.



IN THE U.S., BLACK WOMEN SUFFER from life-threatening pregnancy complications TWICE AS OFTEN AS WHITE WOMEN.





IN THE U.S., BLACK WOMEN ARE

3x MORE LIKELY TO DIE from a

pregnancy-related cause than white women.



Almost 40% of Black mothers experience a MATERNAL MENTAL HEALTH CONDITION such as depression or anxiety. But compared with white women, BLACK WOMEN ARE HALF AS LIKELY TO RECEIVE TREATMENT.



IN DELAWARE, as in the U.S. overall, SUBSTANCE ABUSE AND ADDICTION ARE ON THE RISE, and impacting the health of mothers and their babies.



IN DELAWARE, about
1 OUT OF 3 WOMEN WHO DIED
from pregnancy-related causes had a
MENTAL HEALTH CONDITION
that may have directly contributed
to their death.



IN DELAWARE, 55% OF WOMEN INDICATED THEIR PREGNANCY WAS PLANNED.
